St. Benedict's C of E VA Junior School PE Development Plan September 2021 - July 2022



Key achievements to date until July 2022:

Employing our own PE coach in 2021-22 has been a great success. It has reaped dividends in terms of lunch-time provision and in the mentor role for our pupils: there is also better communication between the PE coach and teaching staff, improving outcomes. Our PE coach has been a key member of staff in organising and running inter and intra school events and in working with Year 5 and Year 6 pupils as sports leaders; we hope to develop this further next year.

We are proud of the manner in which we kept extra-curricular clubs clubs in the autumn and spring terms, before reverting to 'business as usual' in the summer term.

Our participation in inter-school sport has been a strength this year; we entered teams in Boys and Girls football, netball and rounders and placed second in three leagues and third in the other. A particular success was our Girls' Football team qualifying for the county finals and finishing fifth.

Intra-school sport has also been a positive and our PE coach has been instrumental in organising sporting competition within year groups. One integral part of every teacher's week. of the highlights of the year was our Euro '22 football tournaments, based on the women's tournament that England eventually won. We running the events for St. John's and the Lower School. It is part of our remit to ensure that international events inspire 'the next generation'.

Gold Standard for the School Games Mark. Having previously attained a Silver award, we were very proud that our efforts and our commitment to our pupils being active at school have been recognised.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

Sadly, due to the lock down restrictions due to COVID, our local swimming pool was unable to run any schools swimming between March 2020 and January 2022. This has had a huge impact upon our ability to improve our swimming data. Looking forward our aim is to have a real focus on swimming attainment so that more children can achieve the goal of being able to swim 25M.

Our Year 3 and 4 cohorts have school swimming lessons as part of the curriculum. Our aim in 2021-22 was to also offer Year 5 a term of swimming (as they had not previously swum in their time at St. Benedict's due to restrictions). The allocated slot (Autumn Term running, despite the challenges of Covid – we offered year group specific 2021) was hit by Covid safety measures, so this cohort **still** has not swum. Our aim is to address this in 2022-23 as an intervention using the Sports Premium money to help increase the amount of children who can swim by the end of Year 6. In addition to this, we are now offering swimming to Year 5, so in the 2022-23 academic year, all year groups will swim.

> Due to issues with training, it was not possible to continue with Maths on the Move (a Maths intervention that involved pupils being active) in the 2021-22 year. Next year we will invest in ActiveMaths, which we believe will be a similar programme. Our PE coach will be a crucial figure in the delivery of this programme and the hope is that it will be an

We are also keen to develop our young Sports Leaders and aim to resume our playground also held 'Commonwealth Games themed Sports Days, with Year 5 pupils offer of Year 6 pupils running activities. Furthermore, we will seek to cement our links with our feeder school, St. John's, offering PE taster sessions to their pupils to improve their transition; these will be organised by our PE coach and delivered by our pupils.

Due to our commitment to excellent PE provision, we were awarded the In the push to maximise our pupils' active time outside, we will continue to develop outdoor areas, including our World Garden. We hope to offer a 'Gardening' intervention, delivered by a nurture and horticulture expert and targeted at pupils who can struggle in the classroom environment but who flourish outdoors.


